*I'm in Port Orange, and am planning to be at the January 2 meeting. You know how that goes.*

**Do you know how to change text capitalization?** In *Pages*, *Numbers* and *Keynote*, after selecting the words you want changed, go to Format > Font > Capitalization, then choose All Caps, Small Caps, Title or None. In *TextEdit*, select the words, then go to the Menu Bar > Edit > Transformations, then choose the style you need.



**If you are using a checkout coupon code**, once you have typed it in you can right-click on the word(s) you would like to transform, then click on Transformations and choose your preference. I disabled my Caps Lock key because I would accidentally use it. I used System Preferences, clicked on the Keyboard icon, then Modifier Keys and got this screen.

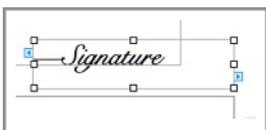
**Here's a site I came across last month** <http://www.imore.com/> and specifically <http://www.imore.com/os-x-mavericks-review> In the paragraphs below 'Compatibility and Updating' you can find whether your present Mac will accept Mavericks. Also you don't need Lion or Mountain Lion, you can install Mavericks right over Snow Leopard. I made sure I backed up my system first and then did Repair Permissions with Disk Utility.

**If you are not a right-clicker**, now may be the time to become one. Right-clicking lets you open a contextual menu, depending on what you are clicking on. Misspelled a word? Right-click and see a correct one. Right-click on an email in the Viewer Window (where you see the emails listed) and you can Delete it right there. See the options if you right-click on a photo, or other image. As in the image of the menu here



**If your mouse appears to have only one button** to click, the right side of that button will act as a Right-click. Yours doesn't? Then go to System Preferences again, click on the Mouse icon, and change the right side to Secondary Click. Or click on the Trackpad icon and put in a checkmark for the box that indicates secondary click. Actually there are a lot of choices on that screen and by clicking on any of them, the video shows you what that option indicates.

**Sometimes I forget that the Force Quit** screen can appear by holding down Command + Option and tapping Escape. (esc is the leftmost key on the top row of the keyboard.) I use Force Quit when an application stops responding for some reason. You can also reach it from the Apple Menu, but sometimes my pointer won't move. Rarely, thank goodness.



By putting a signature in an extra wide text box in *Pages*, I can easily select it to move it if I have to. (The text box extends beyond the layout margin.)

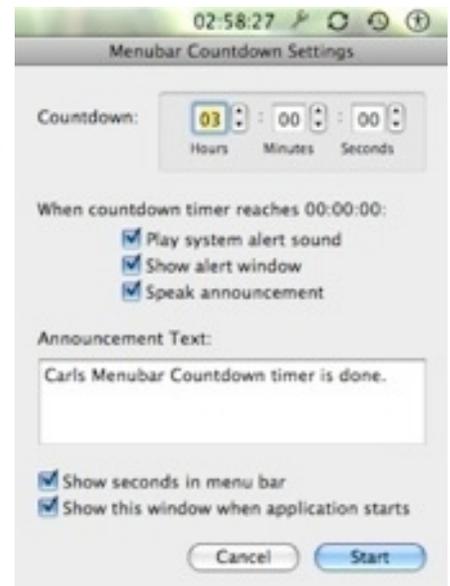
There were 3 Menu bar Apps that I use daily and wanted to show. I had borrowed the club computer and installed them, making sure they worked on Lion (OS 10.7) since my main computer is still using Leopard (OS 10.5.8). Anyway all went well until the meeting. When I attached the display projector connector the on screen video resolution would not show the entire menubar. My Menu bar Apps were invisible. The rest of my show & tell went well.

Below is what you missed:



### MenuBar Countdown

This App when clicked on will let you set up a countdown timer and display on the menubar. When it's done it will give you a message!



### MenuMeters

Gives you a small visual picture of how hard your computer is working.



This tiny display is up there in the menu bar. It shows me when I need to close some apps to speed up the computer.

### JumpCut

A great memory aid, Jump cut lets you have a record of things that you have cut & pasted. After it is installed on your menubar (just doubleclick the App and it will place it on the Menubar), when selected it will display the text of the last 40 or so selected and cut text items.

5From here, you have several options to further configure Siri. Tap "Languages" to set up Siri in another language or accent.

Tap "Voice Feedback" to determine whether Siri always responds to you, or only when your phone is in hands-free mode.

Tap "Raise to Speak" to have Siri awaken whenever you put your phone to your ear and you're not on a call.

6Save your settings, and you're ready to use Siri!
