

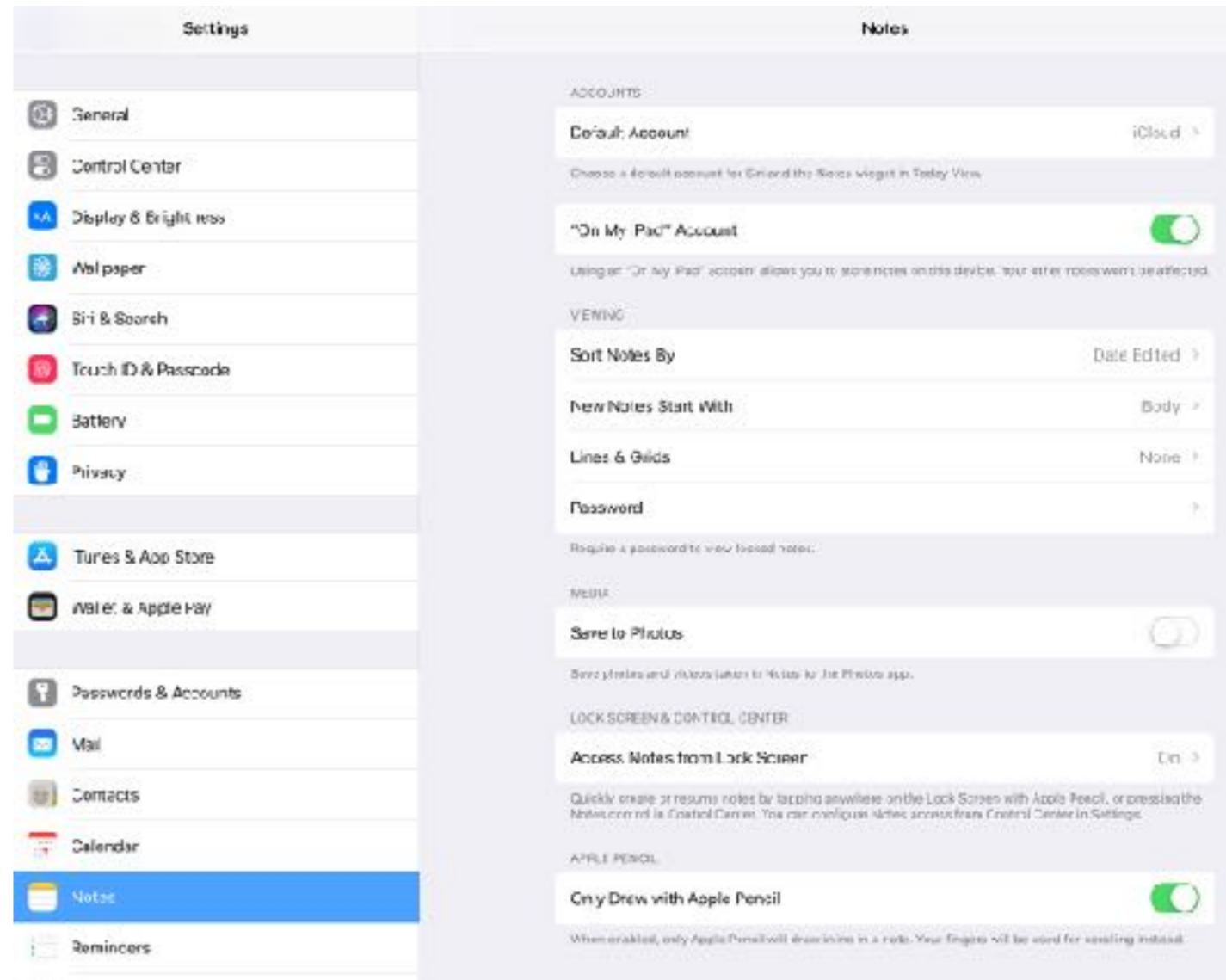
iOS Notes

“On my iPhone” vs iCloud

For example, maybe you got an iPad at one point and it was your only iOS device at the time. Maybe you thought you don't need to enable iCloud because you have no other Apple devices to sync with. Then, you got an iPhone and eventually a Mac. Now, you want to sync your Notes among all your Apple devices.



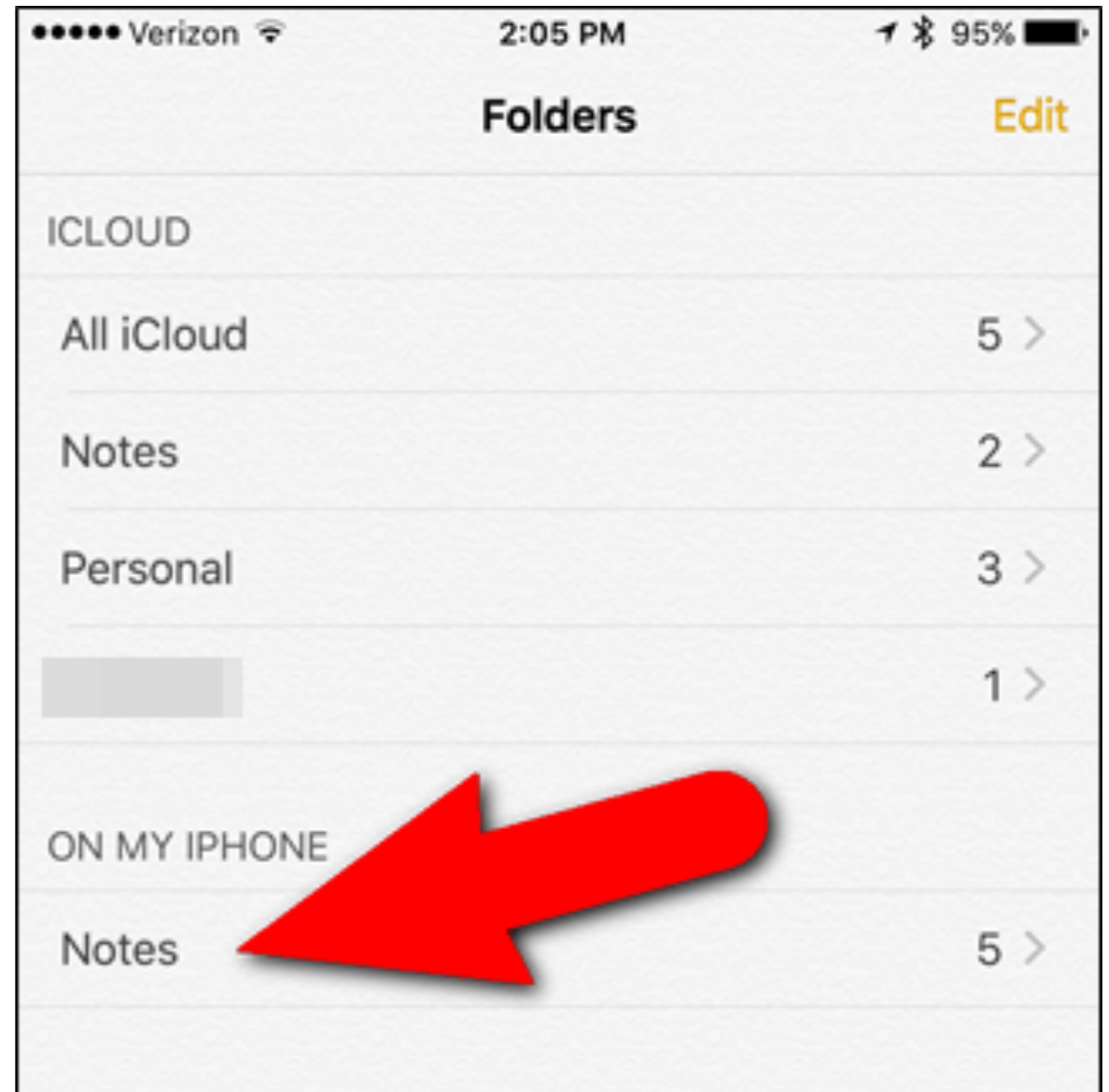
If you don't see a section for "on your iPhone" in your Notes app, you'll need to activate this function. To do this, from your Home screen, go to Settings > Notes and make sure "on my iPhone" account is enabled (the slider button should be green).



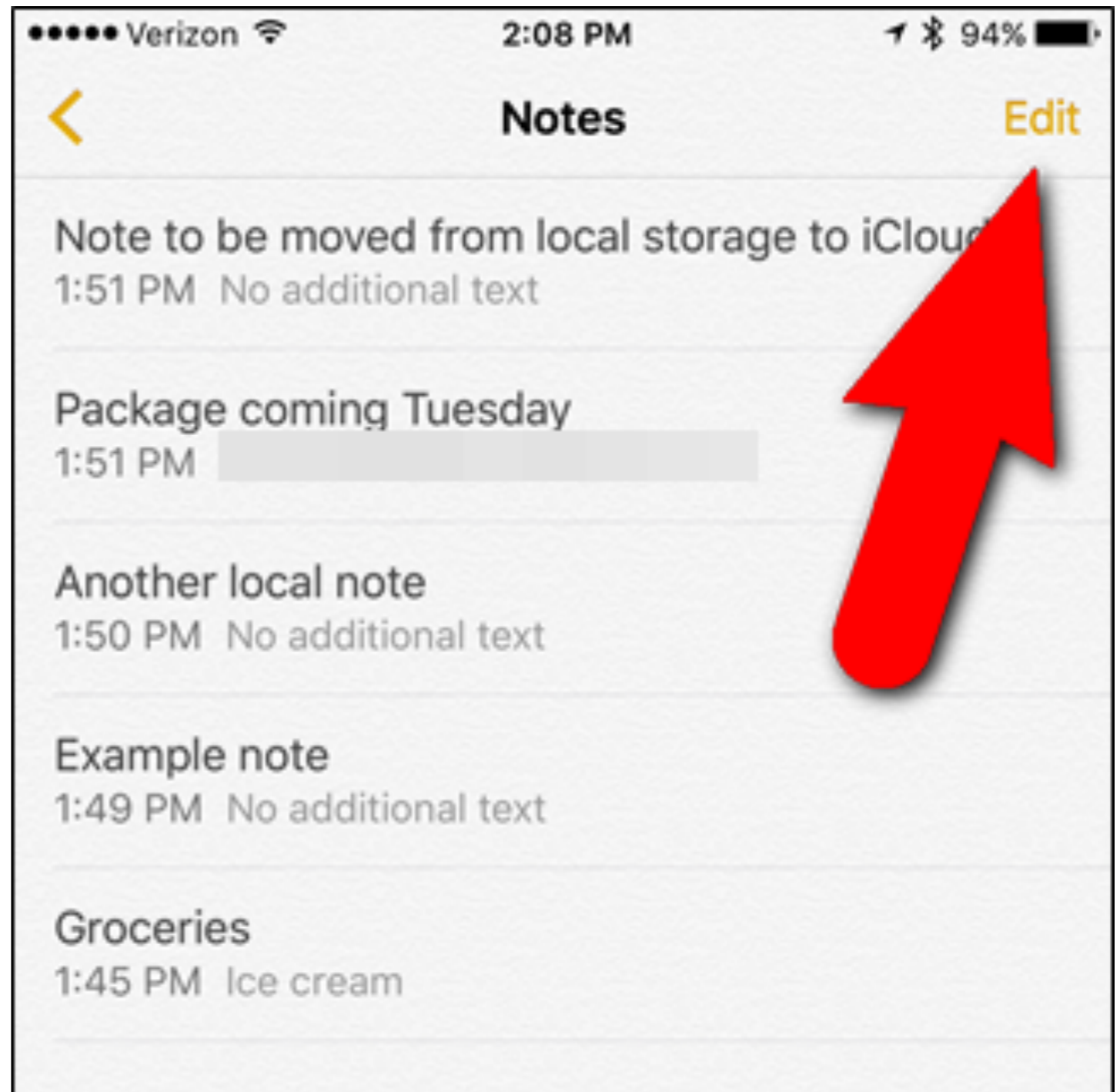
if you don't see a section for iCloud in your Notes app, you'll need to [enable Notes in your iCloud account](#). To do this, from your Home screen, go to Settings > iCloud and make sure Notes is enabled (the slider button should be green).



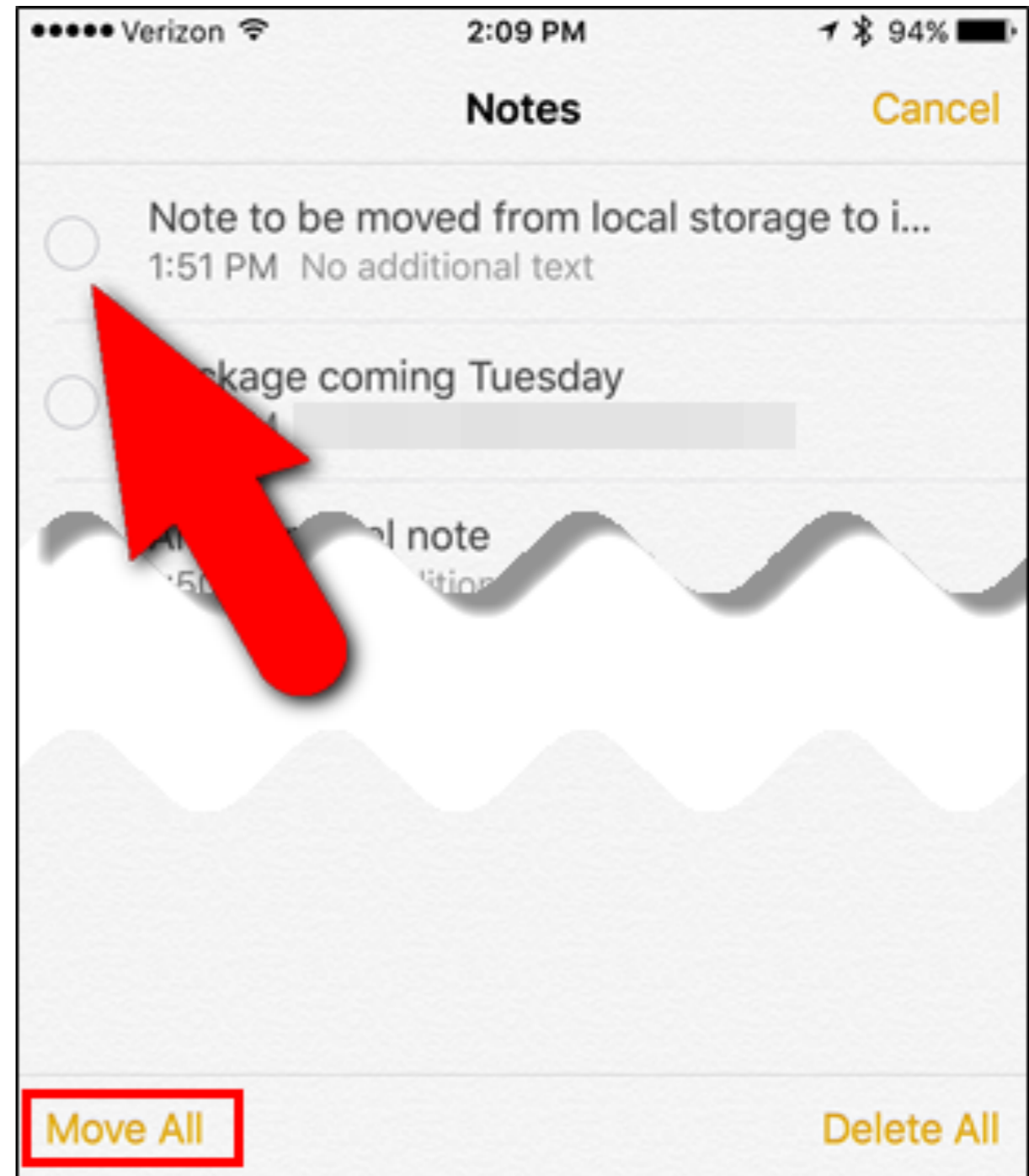
All notes listed under “On My iPhone” (or “On My iPad”) are stored locally on your device. To move any of these notes to iCloud, tap on “Notes”, or on [another folder](#) under “On My iPhone” containing notes you want to move.



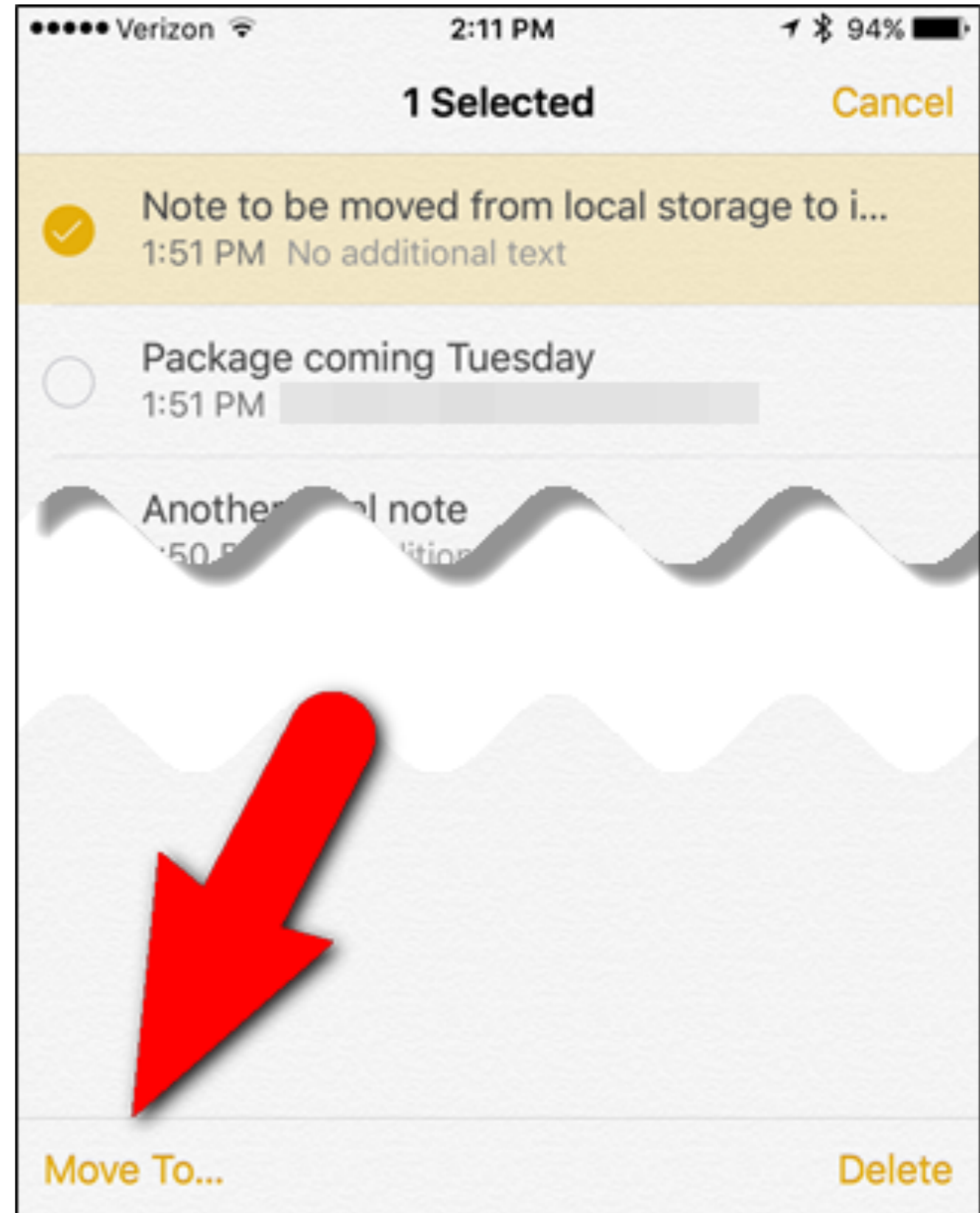
Once you're in one of the folders under "On My iPhone", click "Edit" in the upper-right corner of the screen.



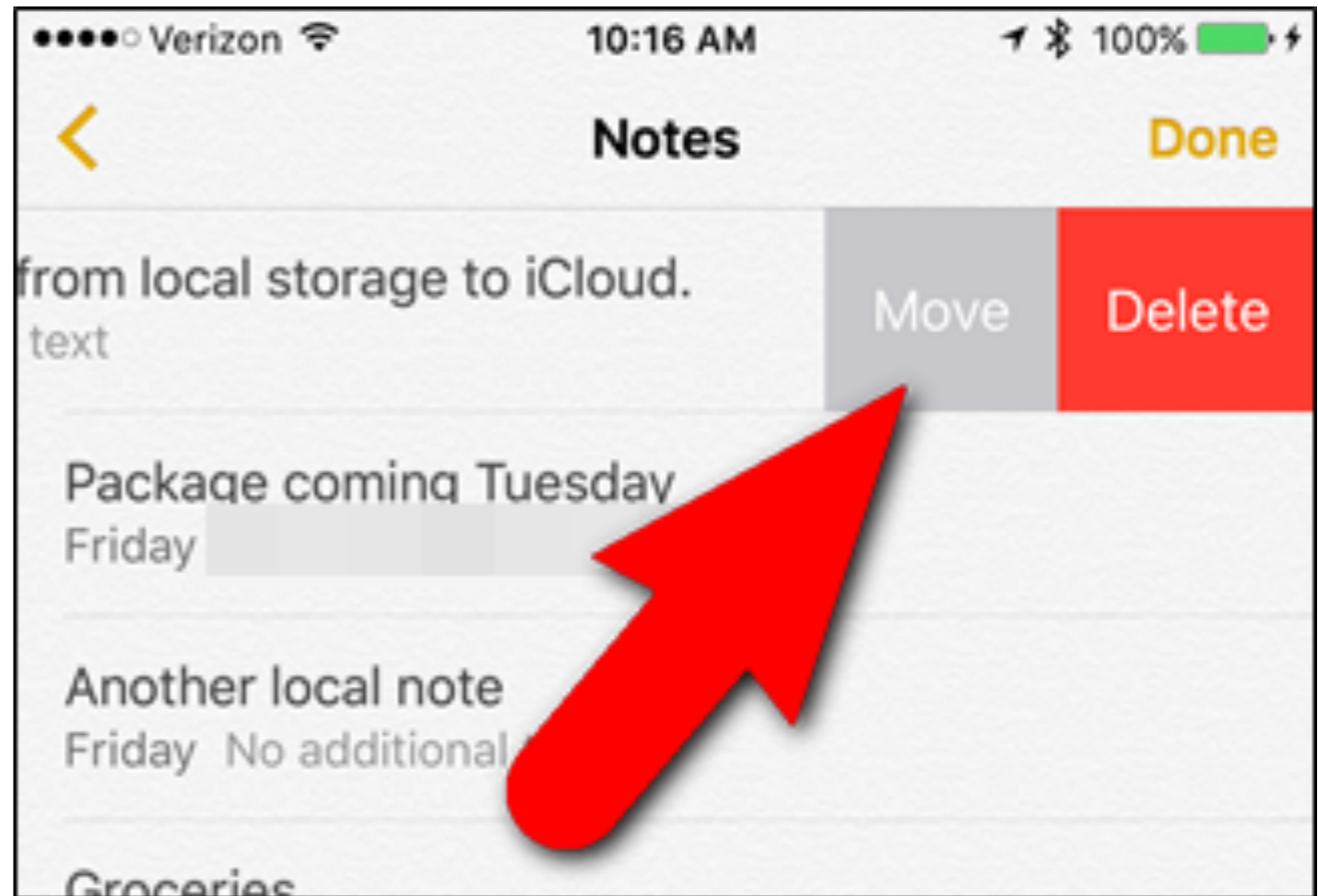
A selection bubble appears before each of the notes. Tap the selection bubbles for the notes you want to move to iCloud.



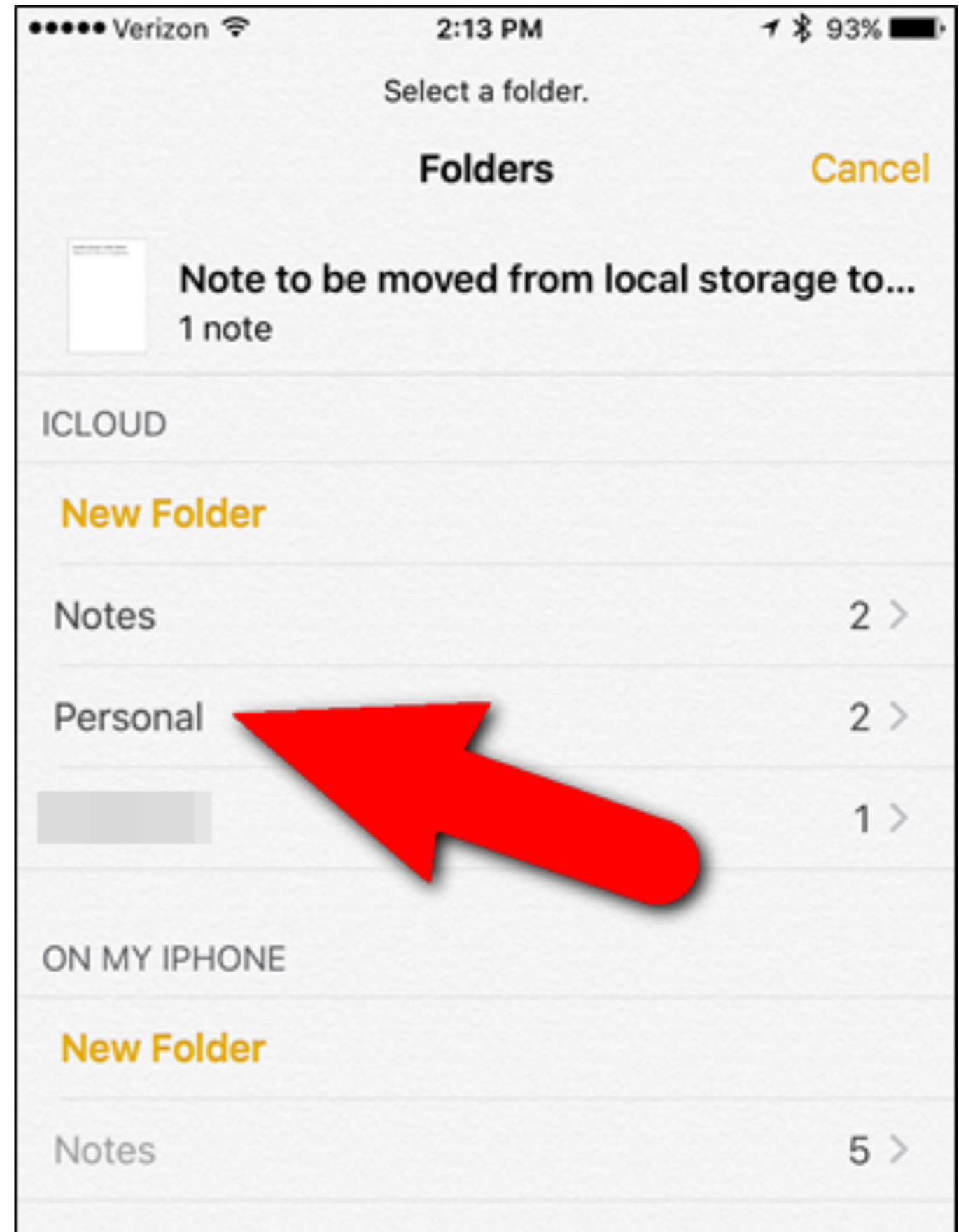
Then, tap “Move To” in the lower-left corner of the screen.



If you're only moving one note, you can quickly move the note by swiping left on it and tapping "Move"



Once you've selected the note to move, the Folders screen displays. Select the folder under iCloud into which you want to move the selected note.



Then, tap “Move To” in the lower-left corner of the screen.
